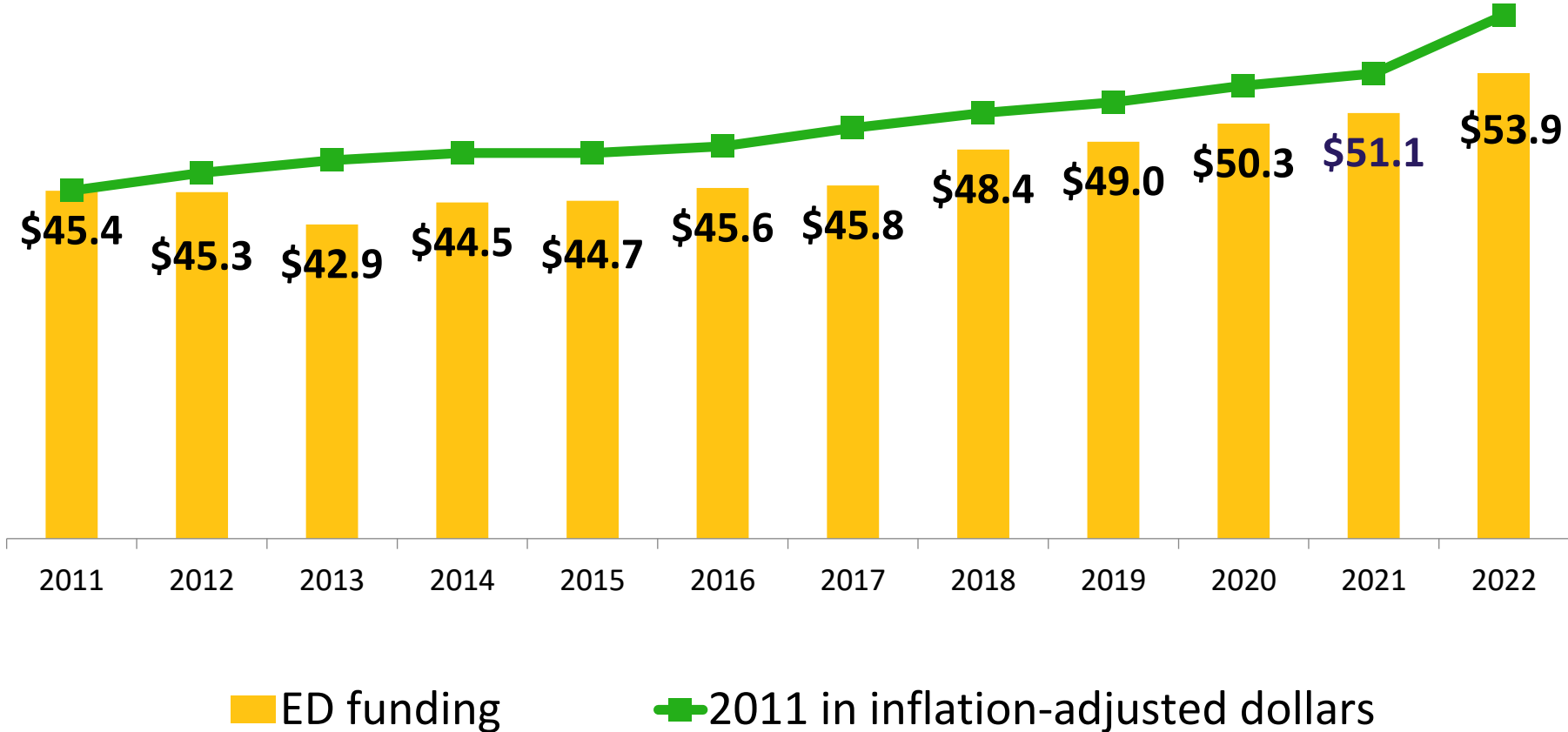


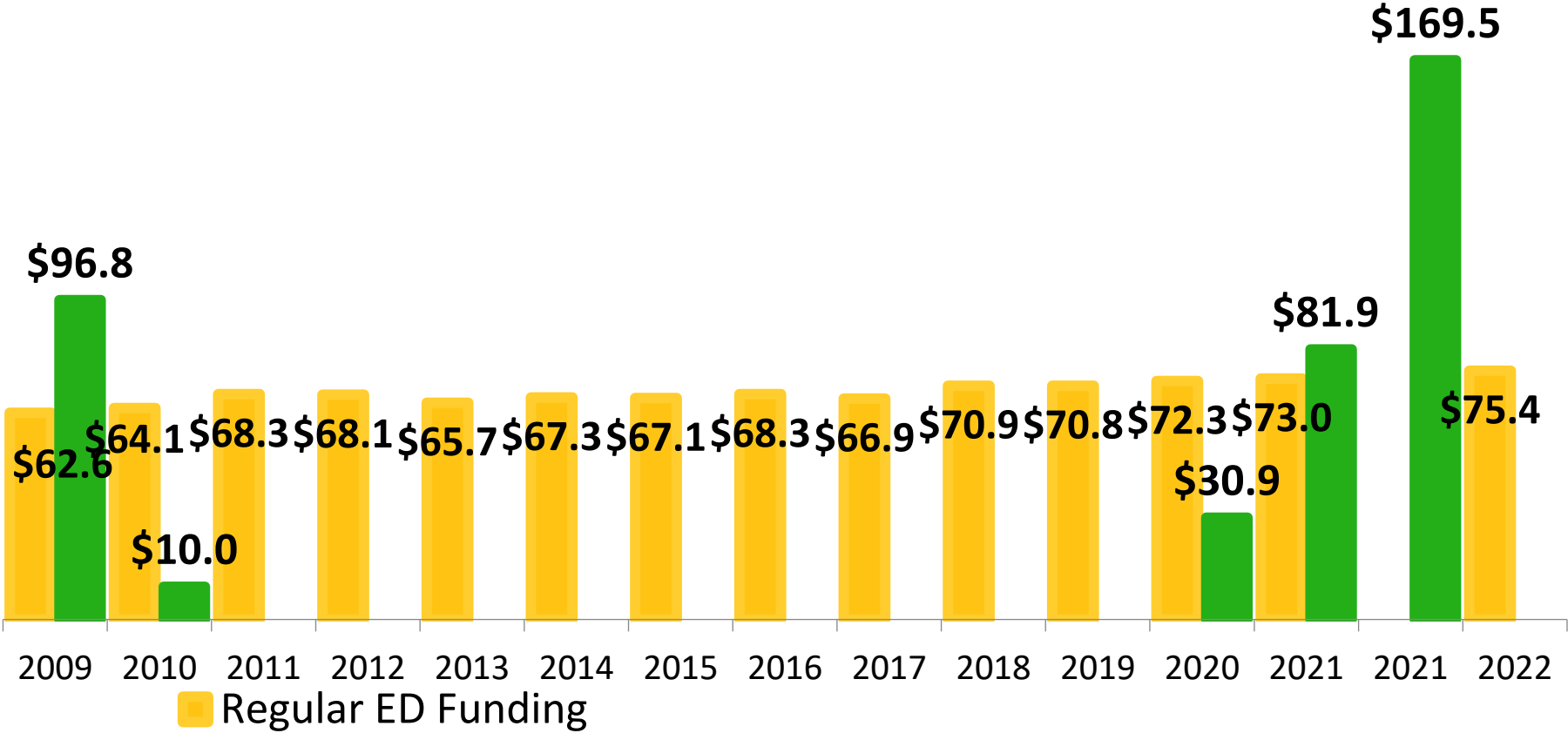

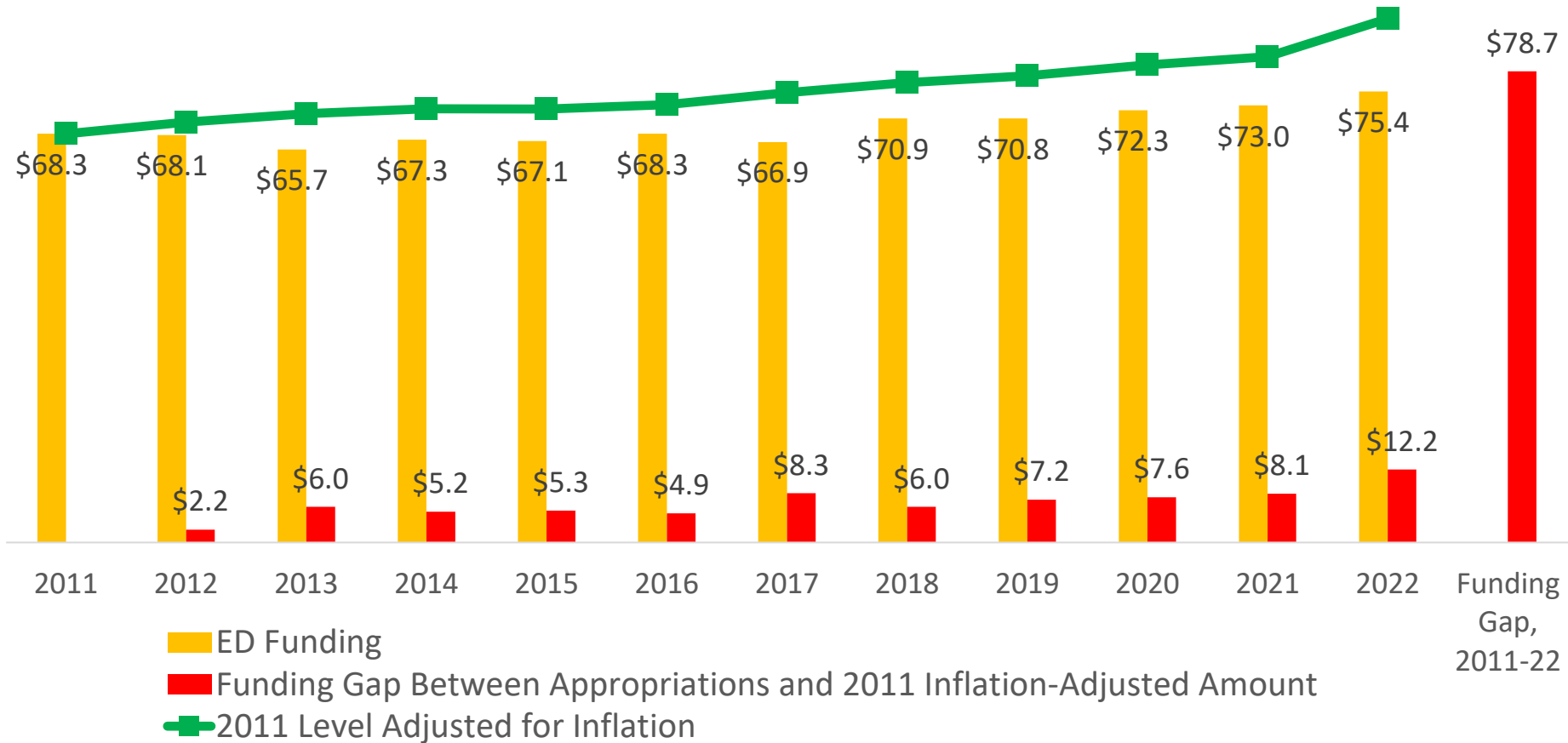

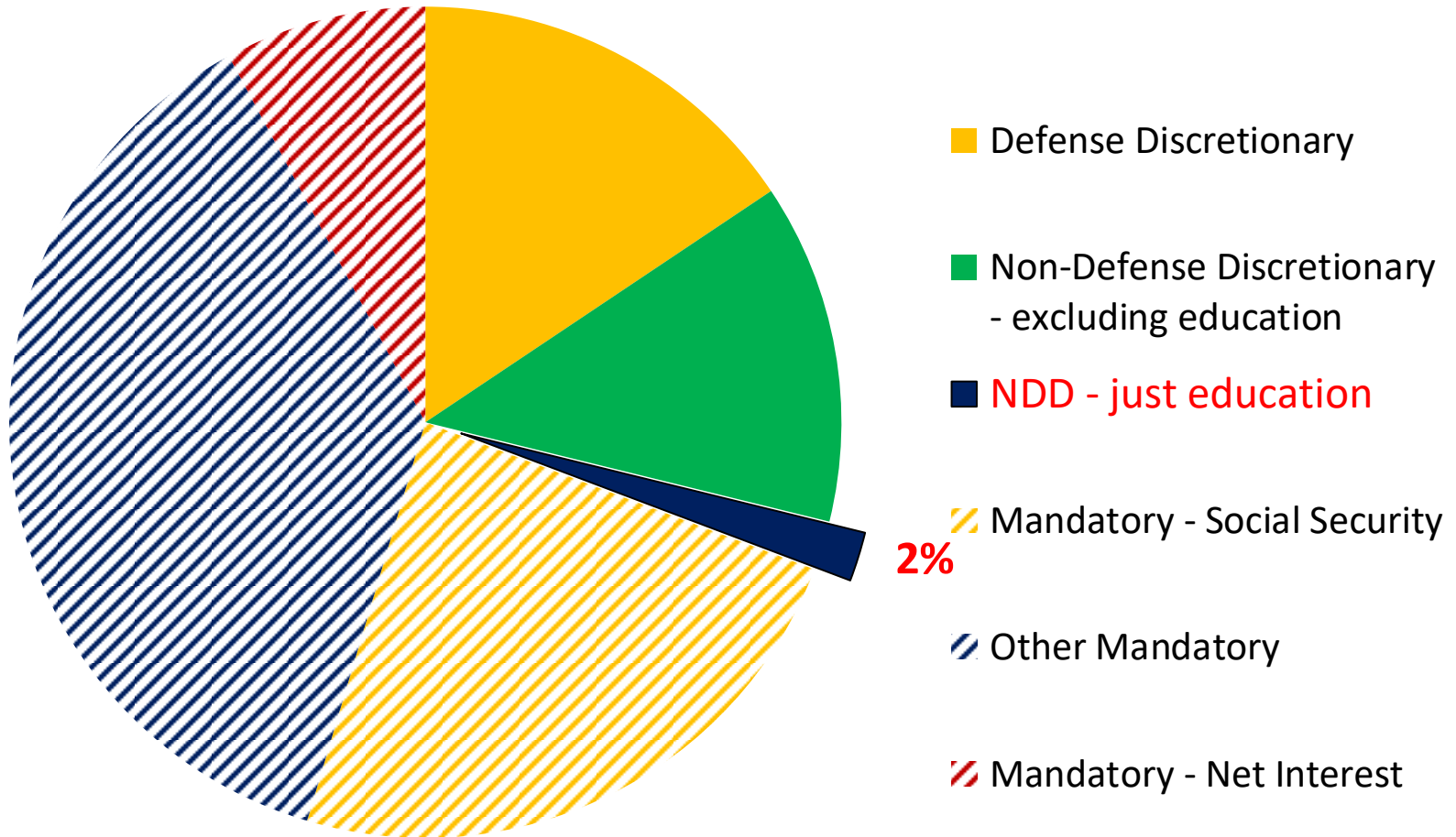

(Department of Education Discretionary Funding in Billions of Dollars)

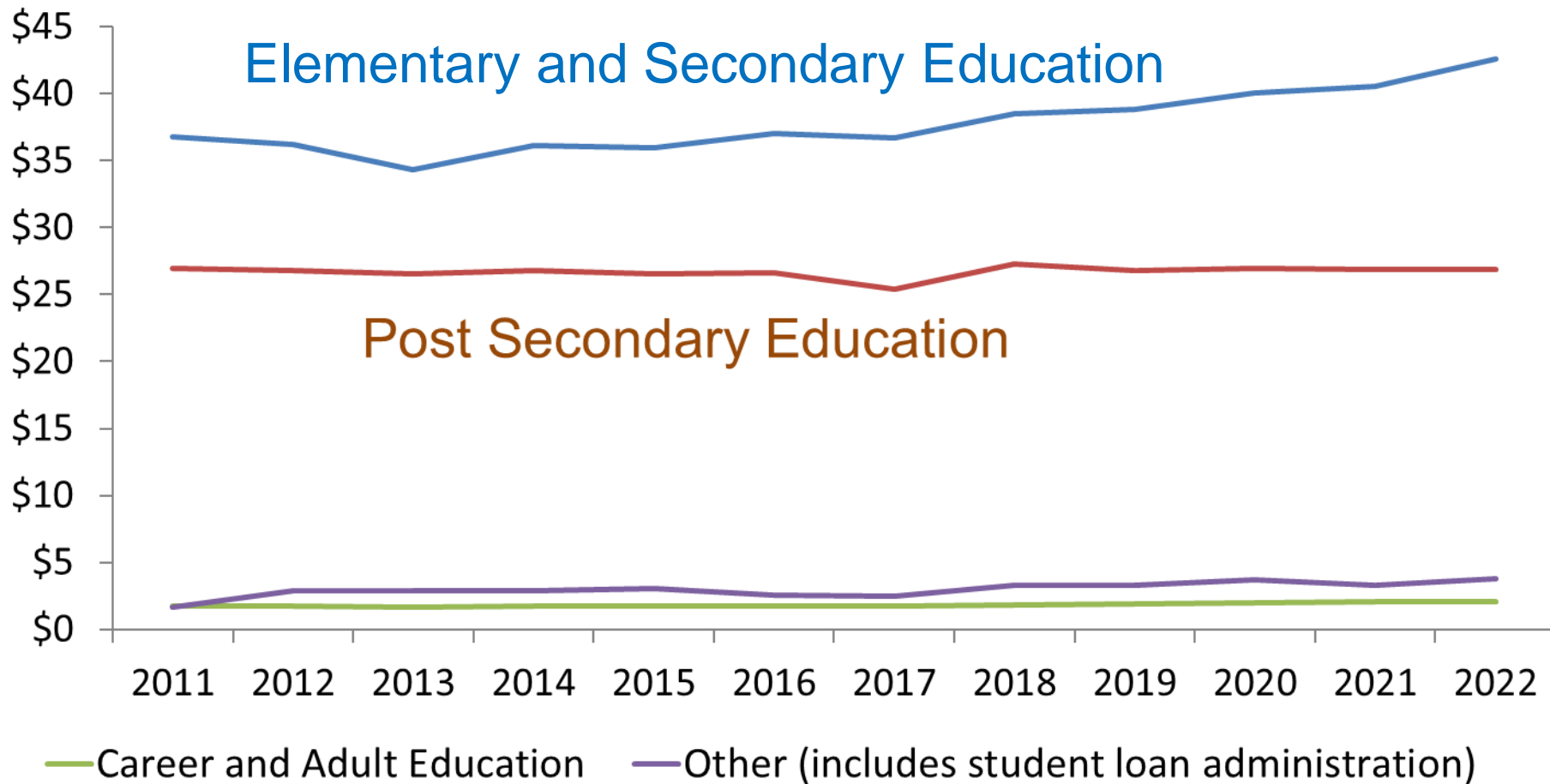


# Education Accounts for Less Than 2% of Annual Federal Spending
